The Summer Season at Stansted has been extremely full-on with all staff and volunteers dedicating themselves wholeheartedly to ensuring that our House Opening, Grounds & Gardens, and events operations, went smoothly. We are just about coming up for air now but are much looking forward to our Halloween and Christmas events which will set the seal on a highly frenetic but satisfying year.

Our visitor numbers at around 6,000 are now back to pre-Covid levels as people slowly emerge from the torpor that that cataclysmic event induced. The bespoke Tours and Heritage Talks have proved immensely popular and there is definitely a keen interest in a more focused analysis of various aspects of the history of Stansted House and the Ponsonby family.

The Summer Festival attracted around 4,000 folk which was a healthy uplift on last year with increasing amounts of eccentric and eclectic entertainment! My thanks, as always, to those FOSP members who volunteered throughout the weekend.



A new addition to our events programme this year was the South Downs Food Festival organised by the Farm Shop. This year's theme was the celebration of the impact of Elizabeth David on British cuisine. The Festival was opened by Dame Prue Leith and proved to be very popular. It is considered to be set fair for the future as it establishes itself firmly in the Stansted Park calendar.

HEAD FORESTER'S NOTES

I am presently busy with preparations for the winter work programme. This will need to take into account the loss of our Assistant Forester Sam, who will be going on a sabbatical for the months of January to April inclusive, we wish him all the very best of luck and safe return from his travels.

The wet summer has impacted many operations in the forest and now the autumn rains have come this is complicating the catching up of many tasks deferred earlier on due to ground conditions. We did manage to get the Highland cattle into the Pond Meadow for a good period this year which has done a great deal of good in grazing or trampling the pond sedge which is trying to take over the sward to the detriment of less robust flora. We have also been helped in the management of this area by the South Downs Rangers and their volunteers who have tackled beds of bramble and pollarded a number of willows to reduce shading of the meadow, for which we are very grateful.

The cutting of chestnut coppice has started with the first block completed. We will need to revisit it after the coppice products have been extracted, as there are a number of dying ash trees that will need to be removed as well. Fortuitously it is between two other recently cut blocks so that we can keep opening areas close to each other, which will provide new violet plants for the Pearl-bordered Fritillary caterpillars to feed on. We saw very few of them this season in the poor conditions during the flight period but I recorded them on two occasions so hope more appeared on suitable days when I was not near their sites to give us a reasonable population for next spring and hope we get the weather for them to thrive.



One of the species we have planted throughout our recent plantings is wild cherry. New improved seed sources are now available to nurserymen which are a huge improvement on saplings used in the past which were coarse and heavily branches. The one we are using is Wildstar and it certainly grows very vigorously with regular whorls of light branches, which make formative pruning very easy. I am hoping that in the years to come these will produce some fine stems suitable for cabinet making and in the meantime, they will give us spring flower and vibrant autumn colour.



Full marks to one of the sharp-eyed naturalists who regularly visit the estate who recently found a fungi that is a new record for us. In fact, it has only been recorded in this country since 2012 originating from Madagascar. It has colonised Australia and New Zealand and now Europe. It is called the Orange Pore Fungus and is very attractive. As it appears to live on small dead branches on the ground I hope that it will not be a problem and just carry on converting fallen wood back into the forest soil.

Let's hope for a drier winter so we can get on with forest operations without significant ground damage which is expensive and time consuming to put right. In the meantime, we can enjoy the autumn colours which as I write are transforming the forest into a palette of many stunning hues.
